

NCER IN CA

The incidence rates for both breast and prostate cancer have increased, likely because of more awareness, which has led to much earlier diagnosis and lower mortality.




COLORECTAL CANCER

Colorectal cancer is the second leading cause of cancer death in Canadians. Five-year relative survival is at 63%, an improvement of eight percentage points over a similar period a dozen years earlier.



Wide variation in incidence rates between provinces may be due to differences in the number of people who receive tests for the disease, or have an environmental reason.



1. Lymphoma is a cancer of the lymphocytes, a type of cell that forms part of the immune system. 2. The part of the throat at the back of the mouth behind the oral cavity. 3.
